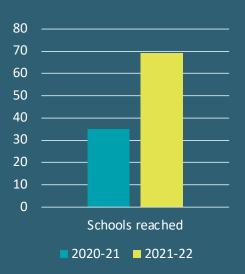

Year in Review

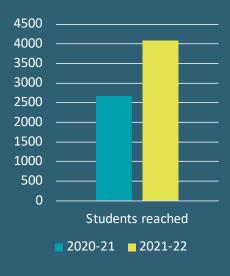
This year JA Newfoundland and Labrador delivered **242** programs to 4080 students in 69 different schools all throughout the province.

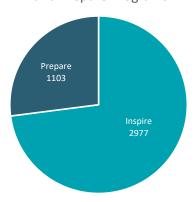
91% increase in School Reach over 2020-21



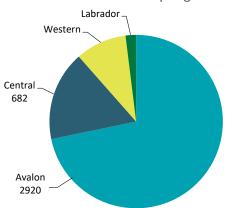
53% increase in Student Reach over 2020-21

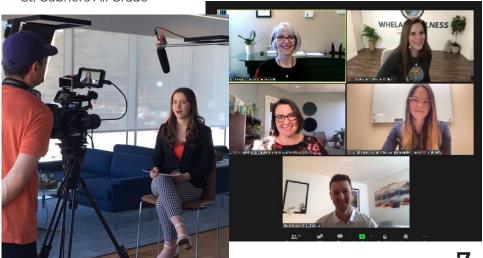
